# Topical Alpha Adrenergic Agonists for Rosacea - Rhofade

- Rhofade® (oxymetazoline hydrochloride 1% topical cream – EPI)

## Coverage Policy

The treatment of the untoward cosmetic effects associated with rosacea (for example: telangiectasia, erythema) are not covered because such treatment is considered cosmetic in nature and not medically necessary. Under many benefit plans, services are not covered when they are performed solely for the purpose of altering appearance or self-esteem, or to treat psychological symptomatology or psychosocial complaints related to one's appearance.

### Conditions Not Covered

**Oxymetazoline (Rhofade) for the treatment of persistent (nontransient) erythema associated with rosacea is considered not medically necessary.**

## Overview

### OVERVIEW

Rhofade, an alpha<sub>1A</sub>-adrenergic agonist, is indicated for the topical treatment of persistent **facial erythema associated with rosacea** in adults.<sup>1</sup> Note: Rhofade is not indicated to treat the inflammatory lesions of rosacea.

### Guidelines

The American Acne & Rosacea Society (AARS) published an update on the management of rosacea in 2019.<sup>2</sup> The treatment of rosacea is based on two major common clinical presentations of rosacea: centrofacial erythema with papulopustular lesions and centrofacial erythema without papulopustular lesions. A gentle skin care and photoprotection regimen is recommended for all patients with rosacea. For centrofacial erythema without papulopustular lesions, pharmacological treatment options include topical alpha-agonists. The topical alpha-agonists typically reduce facial erythema within 30 to 60 minutes, with a peak benefit after approximately 3 to 4 hours.
